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     Motion 3: Romans moved to postpone the public hearing to the February 1, 2005 regular meeting, when
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     the appellant's attorney, Dennis Bartoldus, could be present. Taunton seconded the motion.
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     Mayor White said it was moved and seconded, and called for discussion. There was none. (Copy of

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B. Review of Scenic Lands Projects

3 Project Manager Fran Recht, Melissa Mallott of ODOT, and Pat Moran of Oregon Scenic Byways were 4 present to provide comprehensive answers to Council questions on the projects. Mallott said that Ray 5 Langston, property owner of tax lot 700, told her after the last meeting that she could proceed with 6 getting an appraisal for the deed restriction, and she told him she would need to get the Council's direction before doing this. She clarified that the deed restriction would be a "scenic easement" that 8 would prohibit anything new being built on the property above highway level, that currently-existing structures would be grandfathered in, and that obtaining first right of refusal was in the grant but wasn't 10 their top priority. She suggested moving forward with appraisals on tax lot 700, the property under the 11 bridge by the old Joan-E building, and the property south of the smokehouse. Moran gave an overview 12 of the Scenic Byways program's 10-year history and objectives, noting that the program has no intention 13 of telling local municipalities what they should or should not do with affected properties. He said that in 14 1997 the state of Oregon's Scenic Byways program received fully 10% of all federal grant monies to 15 pursue acquisition of properties mostly along Hwy 101 because of a sense of urgency regarding the loss of views of the Pacific Ocean along the highway. 16

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Motion 4: Jack Brown moved to approve moving forward with the appraisal phase of the Scenic Lands Acquisition Project. Laverty seconded the motion.

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Mayor White said it was moved and seconded, and called for discussion. A Councilor asked who pays for the appraisals; Mallott said it comes out of grant money and matching funds.

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Vote: Motion 4 passed.

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Recht said she did not feel that there will be enough money to proceed on all three properties, and suggested prioritizing.

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<u>Motion 5</u>: Romans moved to consider this project's priorities as tax lot 700, followed by the property under the bridge, followed by the property south of the smokehouse. Laverty seconded the motion.

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Mayor White said it was moved and seconded, and called for discussion. A Councilor clarified the action on tax lot 700 is a deed restriction, and acquisition of the other two properties. Gordon said if appraisal results require prioritization to determine how many can be done, that Staff can utilize the Council's prioritization. Mallott clarified that a deed restriction qualifies as acquisition of a single right.

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C. Tsunami Warning System

Dr. George Priest of the Oregon Department of Geology and Jim Hawley of Lincoln County Emergency Services gave an informative Powerpoint presentation on earthquakes and tsunamis. The information is

46 available at <u>www.oregongeology.com</u>. Follow up discussion included a suggestion to listen to local

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- 1 media for accurate information following an earthquake, and that sirens are costly, not very audible,
- 2 unreliable, and people don't always pay attention to them because of the number of other sirens normally
- 3 heard (see copy of letter from Gordon Priedeman, attached to original of these minutes). The best
- 4 warning sign is the shaking from an earthquake which precedes a tsunami. Hawley noted that Lincoln
- 5 County is safer than the valley due to the risk of chemical spills from railroad cars, high voltage lines,
- 6 and the aviation line under I-5 from Portland to Eugene. Tsunami evacuation maps are available at City
- 7 Hall, the fire station, and the Chamber of Commerce.

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9 Mayor White called a five-minute recess at 8:31 PM. The meeting was reconvened at 8:36 PM.
